

District's Explore, Plan scores rise

While the official release won't be made by the Kentucky Department of Education until late December or early January, schools across the Harlan County School District have recorded a substantial increase in Explore and Plan scores for 2011. In fact, it is the first-time ever that the district has exceeded national averages on the Explore, administered to 8th graders. Our district recorded an Explore score of 15.7 percent, higher than the national average of 15.5.

Plan, the assessment given to sophomores, also increased.

Explore and Plan are considered predictors for future ACT scores. Additional details will be released later.

Congratulations to schools for making AYP on NCLB

The Harlan County Board of Education and the District's administrative staff salute the students, faculty and staff at Rosspoint Elementary, Wallins Elementary, James A Cawood Elementary, Evarts Elementary, Green Hills Elementary and Cawood Elementary Schools for making Adequate Yearly Progress on the No Child Left Behind report. Black Mountain, Cumberland in KMGSI project

Black Mountain Elementary and Cumberland Elementary are participating in a three-year long project known as the Kentucky Middle Grades Schools of Innovation (KMGSI) project sponsored by the Southern Region Education Board and endorsed by the Kentucky Department of Education. The project is aimed at ensuring significant progress is made at each partner school in closing the gap between current student academic performance and the proficient level or above in the areas of reading, writing, and math at the middle grades level for all student groups. The year one focus is on literacy, while year two is math. Year three focuses on overall school reform.

All employees should promote importance of the ACT

ACT scores are one of the tools universities use when selecting students for admission. But they also use score reports for other purposes, such as course placement and student guidance. Here are just four examples of the many ways universities use score reports:

1. **Admissions.** ACT test results - along with high school grades, academic preparation and extracurricular activities - help college admission officers identify which students will thrive at their institution. Scores alone do not determine admission.

2. **Course placement.** ACT scores, academic background and high school grades are used together to determine which college sections would be most appropriate for each student.
3. **Academic advising.** College advisors look at ACT results, high school grades and classes, projected college grades, career plans and other factors to help students find the perfect fit for his or her course of study.
4. **Scholarships and loans.** Some scholarships may use ACT scores and estimated grades to identify qualified candidates. ACT's unique score report also provides information about a student's educational needs, extracurricular achievements and educational plans. Agencies can use ACT data with other data to evaluate applications for both scholarships and loans.

Please help promote the importance of doing well on the Act to all students, beginning at an early age.

A suggestion on your email messages

If you are sending an email that contains a large list of recipients you may want to consider placing the email addresses in the "Bcc" field instead of the "To" field.

Why?

- Using Bcc protects your recipients' private email addresses from being shared with others (from being released into the public domain).
- Using Bcc helps prevent SPAM.
- When using Bcc, messages are easier to read because they contain less text to sift through.
- The cleaner the message, the easier it is to read.
- Because the messages contain less text, they're smaller and require less bandwidth.
- They will download faster.
